Participants must be self-sufficient and be unaccompanied, have appropriate fitness, and work towards a team aim.

Cubs Visit the Maritime Museum and HMS Belfast

With overnight bags loaded on the minibus, the London bound platform at Claygate Station was awash with excited chattering cubs on the morning of Saturday 27th September, waiting for the 9.34am train and the start of an eagerly awaited pack holiday to the National Maritime Museum at Greenwich and a sleepover on board HMS Belfast.

We travelled to the Maritime Museum by train and Uber Boat, and by the time we arrived the cubs were ready to tuck into their packed lunches. After lunch the cubs went off in their small groups of 8 to explore the Maritime Museum, experience the Caribbean take-over including steel bands, and walk up to the Royal Observatory to see the Meridian Line and catch some great views of London. Soon it was time to gather, travel by Uber Boat to London Bridge City and meet the minibus and collect our overnight bags.

We boarded HMS Belfast at 6pm and were met by our concierge who showed us down to the mess decks where we were to sleep. Soon it was time for supper (or more properly "scran") and the cubs enjoyed either fish fingers and chips or macaroni cheese followed by churros with chocolate sauce. The concierge took us back on deck after supper so that the cubs could see Tower Bridge which had been specially lit up in red, white and blue to mark the Roses win at the Rugby World Cup. It was very impressive and memorable. Then it was back to the mess decks to change into PJ's and settle down to watch a movie before lights out, and a night in the bunk beds in a 1950's mess deck.

In the morning most of the cubs were awake when it was time to get up at 7am. Everybody had to get up, dressed and have their bags packed for 8am when the concierge came to get us for breakfast – bottomless porridge, cereal and toast. We then went up on deck for a breath of fresh air and were shown a special handle on one of the gun turrets that we were asked to remember.

Our concierge then took below decks again where she told us two stories – one of which related to the handle she had shown us on deck. During a storm in the Arctic in World War 2 a sailor called John Harrison had been saved from being washed overboard because his hand had frozen to the handle when a huge wave unexpectedly hit the ship - so the handle and the cold had saved his life.

Before touring the ship in groups we took all our bags to meet the minibus which then bought them back to Claygate. The cubs then spent the morning exploring – they went from the top of the ship where they could sit in the Captain's chair to the bottom of the ship where they could see the engine rooms , brig and ammunition store. There were crew quarters to explore, along with the kitchen and medical facility, some naughty mice to find, and the opportunity to design a badge like the ones the sailors wore to show what their job was on board.

It was then time to leave HMS Belfast but not quite time to say goodbye as we ate our picnic lunch sitting on the riverbank near the ship. We then gathered everybody together and headed for the station for an uneventful journey back to Claygate, where some quite tired cubs were re-united with their bags and their parents – there were lots of experiences to recount!















A huge thank you to all those who made this trip possible. Taking 40 cubs to London for the weekend by public transport requires lots of adult support – so thank you to the 18 leaders and parents who helped over the weekend, to Gary who drove the minibus, Mark who was our home contact and to Akela-Lions who made the Sunday lunchtime sandwiches for all those who stayed overnight. Thank you also to the cubs who were well behaved, paid attention and stayed with their assigned adults over the weekend, all while having fun. Scout Troop Summer Camp Wareham, Dorset

26th July - 2nd August

This year we chose to have our annual summer camp at an activity centre near Wareham in Dorset. The centre offered a number of on-site activities including water sports and climbing and was located close to a number of attractions including Brownsea Island, the Swanage Railway and the Tank Museum. Buddens Activity Centre

Scout camp is always packed with great activities- some we have done previously either at Scouts or past camps. The first two days of our camp were devoted to on-site activities which included climbing, zip wire, raft building, kayaking and archery. The events were well organised, and you got to try new things or show your existing talents. We were put into smaller groups to take part, and the instructors and camp leaders make each activity interesting and encouraged us to participate. All the activities help with teamwork and responsibility but are also full of laughter. The kayaks were large enough to take two and you had to wear life jackets in case the worst happened and you capsized, this is quite difficult because you have to paddle in time with your partner. Archery was another good activity with proper long bows and arrows, and you had to shoot targets hopefully without missing. My favourite activity was the raft building where you are given some large buoyant barrels which you need to tie together and get all your team aboard and downstream without sinking or your knots coming undone. 








Band Visit to Belgium



In early September, the Senior Band spent the weekend in Belgium, a superb trip and one that will stay in the memories of all who took part for many years to come. The trip marked the start of a year of celebrations for the band marking 25 years since the band was re-formed.

Leaving Claygate mid-afternoon on Friday by coach, spirits were high, and remained high despite the best attempts of the queues for British and French passport control at the Eurotunnel terminal! We arrived at our accommodation around 9:30pm, grateful for the hot meal that awaited.

On Saturday, breakfast was early as we had a full day ahead ... but there were some surprisingly happy faces.

The band began the morning with a visit to Tyn Cot cemetery, the largest Allied Commonwealth war cemetery in the world. It was a poignant occasion, with many band members searching for the names of distant relatives who fell during the many battles for this stretch of countryside in Belgium.

After some free time in Ypres and a visit to the local museum (and the purchase of vast quantities of Belgium chocolate by some in the band) the band played a concert in Ypres Market Square in glorious sunshine and to a large and enthusiastic audience.

After dinner, our attention moved to the central part of our visit, our performance at the Menin Gate, an impressive monument on which the names are carved of thousands of soldiers who were killed in the Ypres Salient of World War I and whose graves are unknown.

Every evening since 2nd July 1928, at exactly 8 o'clock, buglers of the Last Post Association play their simple but moving tribute to the thousands of Allied soldiers who lost their lives in the battles of Ypres in the First World War.









Young Leaders

Young Leaders keep going from Strength to Strength

Our cohort of Young Leaders at 1st Claygate continues to thrive. We currently have 24 Explorer Scouts who help with the running of the junior sections at their weekly meetings. They will be joined, after half term and in the New Year, by a further six new Young Leaders who have just moved up to Explorers.

Young Leaders are full members of a section leadership team. They are supported both by the adults in a section and by a progressive leadership training programme developed by our own Jonathan Perkins for Surrey Scouts. This programme involves a mixture of online training, practical workshops and fulfilling missions in their sections. A Young Leader starts at 14 and by their eighteenth birthday can achieve a Level 2 BTEC Diploma in Teamwork and Personal Development in the Community. Several of our young leaders achieved this BTEC during the course of 2025, together with



the unique Surrey Senior Explorer Scouts Young Leader award.

Each section hugely values their Young Leaders and continues to rely on their enthusiasm to help deliver the programme. But just as important, is that they are great role models for our Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. This was recognised at the Group AGM in June in when Tom received the Nightingale Award, which is given by Hugh Gosling, our Group Lead Volunteer, to someone in the Group who has made an outstanding contribution - in this case to Willow Beaver colony as a Young Leader.

Duke of Edinburgh (DofE)

Claygate Scouts encourage as many young people as possible to complete their Scouting "Top Awards" – Kings Scout and DofE.

These cover 3 levels: Chief Scout Platinum & DofE Bronze Awards, Chief Scout Diamond & DofE Silver Awards and the ultimate King's Scout & DofE Gold Awards.

Whilst these awards cover multiple requirements, the expedition is always one of the highlights.

Following good success at all levels we were pleased to have 8 Claygate Explorer/ Network Scouts taking part in the challenging KSA/Gold expeditions this year.

The expeditions need to be done as a team and for KSA/Gold there are two separate expeditions (Practice & Assessed) and they both take place over 4 days in Wild Country.

This year they joined with the Surrey County Scouts "Western Watch" team, alongside 30 other participants from across the County.

In addition to the normal Explorer expedition training, the teams took part in a February training weekend to finesse their skills, particularly navigation, and plan their actual expeditions for later in the year.

The Practise expedition was in April and based in the Peak District; the final Assessed expedition was in late August in the Lake District.

As good Scouts they came "prepared" for any conditions on both expeditions; which was lucky as they meet strong sun & icy mornings in April and gale force storms in August – but they prevailed and remained smiling.

The Peak District expedition in April required good open country navigation, and wild camping skills and enabled the team to practise their expedition skills and test their personal equipment. The weather offered wonderful views but the temperatures plummeted overnight testing sleeping bags and/or requiring layers of clothes to be worn. Everyone completed the expedition successfully and felt more confident regarding the assessed expedition later in the year; there were also lessons learned regarding how to reduce rucksack weight.

The Lake District assessed expedition in August started with everyone well prepared, but they were tested right from the beginning as they arrived in awful rain and had to pitch a tent late at night whilst trying not to get too wet. The next day was a preparation day to finalise kit and familiarise themselves with the local environment, before setting off the following day for the actual expedition. A four day self-sufficient and unsupervised route had been planned with overnight stays in campsites, some wild, some formal but all quite basic. The weather was wet for the first few days but with some sunshine there were glimpses of the beautiful mountains and lakes, particularly at height. However the weather got progressively worse in the last few days with gale-force winds and rain forecast on the higher ground, so for safety reasons the teams were diverted on to their pre-planned "foul weather routes" which were similar in length but avoided the high

ground. These conditions tested the team's resolve, navigation and camping skills and the team did well, finishing successfully, tired but in good spirits. The journey back to Claygate was unusually quiet!

Jumble Sales:

They sort through mounds of clothing, toys, books and other bric a brac, run the sale then any surplus is either taken to the local recycling centre or picked up by a recycling company. Each jumble sale generates about £2,000 of sales for the Group, and more importantly helps ensure that items no longer required by their original owners are recycled for use by others – surely a good thing.



Bedding Plant Sale:

The Bedding Plant sale in May has been operating for over 20 years, supported by our supplier Shane who consistently provides high quality plants that are admired by our customers. Since COVID we have only supplied plants to order, but the success is measured by the customers who come back year after year. Thanks to the helpers who ably sort over 2000 items for pick-up by our customers.


